

The Gift of Giving



Eventually, in some shop I found a plastic model of a silver trophy. Underneath it was a plaque that read, "To the best father in the world." Rabbi Yohanan ben Zakkai was once leaving Jerusalem. Rabbi Joshua was walking behind him and saw the Temple in ruins.

Rabbi Joshua said, "Woe unto us for the destruction of the Temple, the place of atonement for the sins of Israel!"

Yohanan replied, "My son, do not worry – we have another form of atonement like it. What is it? Acts of lovingkindness. As it is written: For I desire acts of lovingkindness and not sacrifice. [Hosea 6:6]"

A Torah of Hesed

Doing righteous deeds of charity (*tzedakah*) is greater than offering all of the sacrifices, as it is written, "Doing righteousness and justice is more acceptable to the Lord than an offering." (Prov. 21:3)



Steadfast Love // Lovingkindness // Covenant Loyalty

The sages taught that acts of kindness (hesed) are superior to charity in three ways: charity can be done only with money while acts of kindness can be done with one's person and with one's money; charity is giving to the poor while acts of kindness are for both the poor and the rich; charity is giving to the living while acts of kindness are for both the living and the dead.


